Subject: Opportunity to provide input on OHCHR project on prosecutions of companies for severe human rights abuses

The UN Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights is seeking to speak with prosecutors who have an interest in or experience with bringing cases against corporations for involvement in serious crimes (including e.g. corruption and bribery, environmental crimes, securities fraud, and international crimes).

The inputs will feed into OHCHR's ongoing <u>'Accountability and Remedy Project'</u>, which aims to contribute to a fairer and more effective system of domestic law remedies in cases of business involvement in severe human rights abuses. The project is subject to a mandate from the Human Rights Council, and OHCHR will be submitting recommendations and findings to the Council in June 2016. The inputs will also feed into the International Corporate Accountability Roundtable (ICAR) and Amnesty International's <u>'Commerce, Crime, and Human Rights'</u> project. OHCHR, Amnesty International, and ICAR are collaborating on collecting input and data for their respective projects, both of which seek to understand the challenges and opportunities that investigators and prosecutors experience in bringing cases in domestic courts for corporate involvement in severe human rights abuses. The projects will also seek to provide recommendations to States of how to overcome the identified challenges.

In particular, OHCHR, ICAR, and Amnesty International are interested in information regarding the legal, practical, and political challenges that investigators and prosecutors face when pursuing enforcement or prosecution actions against companies for violations of public law that are linked to human rights abuses. In addition, interviews may ask for feedback on draft recommendations.
