
Decision Making

What is LEAT?

- A proven law-related education program
- Primary school students
- Ages 10 -12
- Taught voluntarily
 - Prosecutors and other criminal justice professionals
 - One hour each week
 - 20-week curriculum



LEAD GOALS



- To teach children about the criminal justice system
- To teach children about the importance of making the right choices in life



Focus

- Legal and social consequences of common juvenile crimes
 - Gang affiliation
 - Truancy
 - Drug use
 - Theft
 - Graffiti
- Techniques for conflict resolution and peer pressure
- Life skills, social responsibility and respect for diversity



Curriculum

- Role-playing activities
- Interactive lessons
- Concludes with a scripted mock trial





Development and Research

- Developed by the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office in 1993.
 - More than 30,000 students in Los Angeles County have completed the program.
- Partnered with the Constitutional Rights Foundation (CRF) in 2003.
 - CRF is a nationally recognized U.S. Leader in Law Related Education Programs
- Two-Year evaluation published by academic researchers in 2005.



 Project LEAD provides students with the tools and experiences to help students assess difficult situations and make appropriate decisions with a clearer understanding of the consequences.





Evaluation Results

- Participation in Project LEAD appeared to provide a "Protective Factor" in which students:
- Maintained positive attitudes about laws, lawyers and authority figures
- Increased their understanding of the consequences of their decisions
- Developed an understanding of the importance of tolerance
- Maintained positive educational and career aspirations



Expansion of LEAD

- The program has been implemented in various locations throughout the USA
- Several countries have shown an interest in adopting the program



Expansion of LEAD



- Quebec, Canada implemented -October 2014
- Curriculum translated from English to French
- Lessons adapted to laws and cultures of the region
